GETTING BACK TO BASICS

At the Special Olympics one year, six young men were to run a hundred-yard dash. They lined up, waited for the starting gun and then they were off. About halfway down the track, the young man in front stumbled and fell. Almost immediately, the other five men stopped and helped him up. When they had dusted him off and decided that he was all right, they then decided to finish the race. But none of the judges could really tell who won the race for their vision was impaired by tears of joy. No one in the stands that day would ever forget this incident or how proud they were for each of the persons that participated in these events. These young men cared more about their fallen friend than they cared about winning a race. They seemed to understand what the race was really all about.

This is the picture of what God wants from the church. He wants us to care for one another, and to be strengthened in faith to better serve others. How do we go about that? How do we train ourselves to "get back to basics"? In Colossians 2:1-7, Paul gives us an idea. His encouraging words end: "so then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness."

That sure seems basic. After all, there are only two things we are to focus on. We are TO LIVE in Christ. And we are to BE THANKFUL. Every other virtue of Christian living is just a "bi-product" of these two choices.

Things like... being faithful in difficult times, showing love in our relationships, welcoming growth in knowledge and understanding, practicing discernment in confusing times and being disciplined in discipleship and consistent in our daily living. These all come from getting back to our basics: living in Christ and being thankful.

As a pastor, I continue to marvel that it's not really how much we know about the Bible, it's about how we follow. It's not about our "church I.Q."; it's about our character.

Throughout the year we challenge each other to "keep it basic" with our Christian discipleship. Daily, God offers us the ability to get "back to essentials" in our relationship with Him. So, let's not wait until Advent, or Lent or some other "special season" of grow with God. Summer is a perfect time to regroup and invite God to do a new thing in us. These warm months ahead will provide us with many opportunities to simplify and get back to the simple things of faith and faithfulness. Let's commit to our fellowship with one another as we serve and grow together. May we remember that it's all about "living in Christ" and "being thankful" for God's love. By this we win the only race that matters! I hope you have a great summer. Let's spend this time growing in Jesus together!

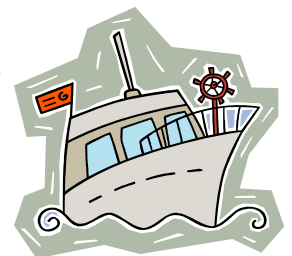

OUTREACH EXPANDED

Picnic lunches for Community Bible School and a lunch for cast and crew of Advent Play rehearsal day as well as lunches for summer program at Neighborhood Center were provided. Florence Heilman sewed children's clothing for Red Bird Mission and McCurdy School. Ruth Keech was a leader at Bethlehem Farm Day Camp. Betty Kohr coordinated meals for the camp. Some meals were prepared in our church kitchen. In 1978 Delores Runkle was hired as camp cook and served approximately 25 years. Esther Gable scheduled helpers. The women also made trips to CWS Service Center in New Windsor, Maryland, to deliver and help sort clothing for needy people in the world.

HUMAN TRAFFICING

Why should we be concerned? Because this is going on, not only around the world, but also in our own town of York, believe it or not. About 800,000 men, women and children are trafficked each year around the world and 17,500 of them end up in the United States. "There's this belief that it's York, it's not going to happen here...Yes it is." In February of 1980 the unit ratified the Charter for Racial Justice working on policies 2 & 3. Support was given in the form of funds and service to the newly established First Spanish Church this year. Deborah Siders served as a child care volunteer for Hispanic children at Asbury UMC so mothers might attend UMW monthly meetings. Eight women attended Schools of Christian Mission at Lycoming College. The Thank Offering in 1982 was \$1,099.85. In 1984, Quincy Home and Orphanage was no longer allowed to accept home secured canned food which many of the ladies in earlier years provided. That year Joanne Pickard spear-headed, prepared and served desserts at the city Soup Kitchen in Christo Salvador Catholic Church on South Street. In 1989 the Soup Kitchen moved to South George Street with a new name, "Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen." In 1985 they participated in the Campbell Soup Company Boycott. In 1988 participation in Support for Incarcerated Women through Prayer (SIWP) project created by York District UMW began and continues with prayer and greeting cards for the women prisoners at York County Prison. In 1989 UMW sponsored a Parent Time Out held at the church and open to the community. Over the years baby showers were held for church World Service, Neighborhood Center, Harrisburg and Bell shelter. Food and toys were delivered to the Lehman Center when the ladies visited. Some projects to which money was donated were an octave of hand bells to the church in honor of Reverend Roger and Ruth Keech, \$100 to McCurdy School, New Mexico, where plaques recognizing donors were placed on the new gym wall. Persons and areas of mission supported were Ruth Stambach, McCurdy School, New Mexico; Robert and Elaine Landis, Red Bird Mission, Kentucky and Jim and Bernice Keech serving in Nigeria. Lorraine Shindler attended Assembly in Philadelphia in 1992

RESPONSE MAGAZINE REVIEW—by Inga Miller

Response has a new look! As I began leafing through the May 2010 issue I realized that it has a new and improved look and layout. It's departmentalized into sections – **think, learn, live, give, listen, act and pray** - which tends to emphasize the focus and the purpose of the articles in each section. It also has a **new logo and tagline** on the cover. Harriett Jane Olson gives this explanation: "Faith – Hope – Love in Action" are the core values of United Methodist Women. As you can see throughout this issue, stories of Faith – Hope – Love in Action abound! We're adding this phrase to our logo to communicate to others what we are about, and it might remind United Methodist Women members, too. This issue of Response challenges us to think, to learn and to act, and closes with a prayer that ends with, "May we always incarnate mission as finding a way for the whole created cosmos to live with integrity, wholeness and peace. Amen." Amen.

A Cheer Secretary was added to the roster of officers in 1963. Alice Eyler served many years and was succeeded by Irene Keeseey, Dalah Witmer, Mary Hartman, Jean Lightner. In 1992 Beulah Trout became Cheer Secretary and in the past 18 years she has sent well over 2,000 cards—Get Well, Birthday, Births and Baptisms, Sympathy and Holiday cards to shut-ins. This is a significant endeavor and she is commended.

A NEW ERA

In 1990 Five Channels of Undesignated Mission Giving (World Thank Offering, Gift in Memory, Gift to Mission, Special Mission Recognition and Pledge to Mission) was established by the Conference UMW and Messiah was the only unit in York District to receive a plaque that year. Having missed several years, we now have 12 consecutive awards. Some of the projects during the 90's included making quilts for AIDS Babies, blankets for York Hospice and Pleasant Acres, collecting prizes for Bingo at Normandie Ridge and making Apple Dumplings for their Annual Day Celebration. The Unit had three areas for giving in the budget until 1993: Pledge, Administration and Membership Development and Local. Local money was used for projects in the church such as reupholstering chairs in the parlor, improvements in the kitchen, carpet cleaning, Drapery Fund, etc. *Continued on next page*

United Methodist Women's funds are to be used for mission so the local fund was placed in a separate bank account which is kept by the Kitchen Committee. They have been able to support projects of the church, local mission and the pledge. A Berkley Forge Bench for the west entrance porch was donated to the church in honor of the 25th Anniversary of UMW in 1997.

At one time there were 18-20 persons in the Reading Course program with an average of 8 completing the course annually. Leah May Foller became coordinator in 1983 and, with the exception of one year, continues as "keeper of the books". In 2006 there were just 4 qualified readers; Louise Brown—7 years, Darlene Geesey—8 years, Geraldine Shelley—24 years and Lorraine Shindler—26 years. Books the unit purchases are kept in a designated area of the church library. Also provided is the annual Prayer Calendar and a subscription to *RESPONSE* magazine for the church parlor.

FORWARD WITH CREATIVITY

We are able to maintain an expanded structure (more than 6 officers) with 9 officers and coordinators and 4 Key Persons to related organizations. Those being Church Women United, Neighborhood Center, Normandie Ridge Auxiliary and Mission Central. Programs for 8 meetings a year feature some from the UMW Program Book, current issues and interests benefiting women and children. The men host a Mother Child Dinner in May. Thank Offering is observed along with Harvest Home Food for the WELL. Church Women United meets at Messiah to wrap Christmas gifts for South Mountain Restoration Center.

A well attended new venture begun in 2005 is the Hospital Tea. As the result of a survey of ladies in the church, a tea was suggested by Deborah Firebaugh. The committee of younger women plan and prepare and the men of the church serve. Though not a fund raiser, half of the proceeds are designated for the Pledge. Another group are known as the Knit Wits. Organized by Delores Runkle, Becky Bowman and Betty Lou Cowey, women are taught how to knit. Projects are shawls and caps for Cancer and Dialysis patients. Caps are also given to the WELL and to Neighborhood Center. Women are also involved in the Sew and Sows led by Connie Kepner sewing diapers for Grace Children's Hospital in Port 'O Prince, Haiti, School Kit bags using drapery fabric from the original window coverings of the church, bags in which to place information for breast cancer patients, stomas for laryngectomy patients and quilt patterned Prayer Squares.
